










Where we work























Our DigitAll Program

Goal

Empower students with the digital skills necessary for getting a job, and overcome digital exclusion so that students can access fully online public support services.

Description

4 modules to acquire basic digital literacy and workplace-related digital skills.

Certifications and Target Skills:

- End goal of achieving ECDL Certification (European Computer Driver's License), the world standard in recognizing competency for workplace-related digital skills.
- Familiarization with soft skills and workplace culture.
- Pedagogy adapted to a non-French-speaking demographic.























Our Code Program: DigiStart and DigiTous

Goal

Web development is currently the fastest growing career field in tech, as measured by the number of entry-level job posts. DigiStart and DigiTous give students the skills and portfolio they need to launch web development careers.

Course Structure

- Intro course: DigiStart, 2 months (36 hours)
- Intensive fullstack training: DigiTous, 4.5 months (600 h)
- · Mandatory Apprenticeship (4-6 months, full time)

Certifications and Target Skills:

- Students can earn a Web and Mobile Developer Diploma, accredited at the same level as a 2-year college degree.
- Curricula emphasizes soft skills.
- Instructors teach in-demand programming languages.

Our Global Digital Inclusion Program (DIP)

Goal

Empower refugees and other displaced peoples with a means of income through training in digital skills and online freelancing.

Course Structure

A 6-month course teaching online freelance skills, including how to run and manage an online business.

Students begin their freelance work during the training course, under the supervision of professional trainers.

Certifications and Target Skills:

Students earn a Konexio certificate in digital freelancing.

Course focuses on the specific needs of freelance work (business relationship, time management, communication skills).

Instructors offer topic-specific workshops for relevant skills (professional English, image editing).























KPI and Impact tracking: real outcomes

92% professional Integration (entrepreneur or freelance)

87.5% Reported a sense of greater social integration

80% of students completed and passed the exit exam to graduate

83.3% Engaged in income-earning activity

485.41 USD average initial earnings per month per student





















Digital Divide during Covid crisis

- Society's most vulnerable groups -- low-income, school dropouts, people of color, refugees and migrants -- disproportionately make up the losing end of the digital divide.
- Only 4% of people with less than a high school diploma report being able to work remotely.
- Women are disproportionately impacted: disseminating public health information or tracking symptoms is limited by inequalities of smartphone access across gender, wealth and other lines
- More than 50% of our students did not have computers and/or a connection for remote monitoring





















Global Initiative

California

- State is partnering with companies and donors to distribute 70,000
 laptops, Chromebooks, and tablets, and provide hundreds of thousands
 of households with internet access.
- Nearly 200 telecom providers in the US have pledged to waive data caps and overage fees, and not< cut off internet service to families who can't pay.
- Many banks are encouraging people to use digital banking services, and training those who don't know how to manage their money online.



















Global Initiative

South Africa

- South Africa's government is partnering with telecom providers to offer education and health websites free of charge, with no data needed.
- International NGOs such as the IRC have adapted their <u>digital</u> tools to reach a non-digital audience by mobilizing a network of trusted sources to relay accurate information.





















Global Initiative

France

- The government has launched an online platform and hotline, <u>Solidarité</u>
 <u>Numérique</u>, to provide resources and connect those who are digitally
 excluded to trained mediators that can help facilitate their access to
 basic services
- Recovery plan: €250 million for digital inclusion

4 000 digital advisers will be recruited, trained and deployed to develop workshops and digital. The State is financing their training and activities, with a budget of 200 million euros.

The State is also funding the design and deployment of accessible and attractive digital inclusion kits for all local structures/40 million euros






















Program adaptation

Online Mentoring: Development of an online mentoring program which offers one-on-one support for topics relating to professional integration, such as writing a CV and cover letter, preparing for a job interview, and strategizing for career growth

Mobilization in the Greater Community

- Participation in a digital inclusion initiative co-piloted by the Mednum_and the French Secretary of State in Charge of Digital Affairs, entitled "Solidarité Numérique" (Digital Solidarity)
- Participation in a working group led by the High Commissioner for Refugees and the Interministerial Delegation for the Reception and Integration of Refugees focused on sharing good practices and maintaining social ties which contributed towards their inclusion of a policy combating digital exclusion in their national strategy
